

If everything go fine, you will see following message:



In some case, you can see on screen following message:

 Installer::install: The language file 'language/pl-PL/pl-PL.plg\_content\_calendar\_icon.ini' could not be installed because the Administrator language package for 'pl-PL' has not been installed or does not exist.

It's possible that you can see this because you don't have installed other than English languages (in this case Polish) and directories don't exist. You should ignore this message.

## Configuration

Now you have to enable and configure the plugin. Select box along „Content – Calendar Icon” and choose **Edit** Button. You will see following screen:

Screen of plugin configuration

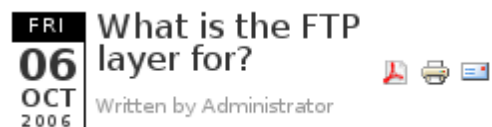
To Enable plugin, select **Yes** from Detail box. Now you can configure date format.

As you can see, there are 6 parameters:

**Filename of style:** Define file name which provide style of calendar look (built-in: *standard.css*, *black\_day.css* [look below]). Styles are placed in following directory: */plugins/content/calendar\_icon/*. As can you see, you can create own style sheet and set by this field.

**Show day of week:** Show day of week in format: MON, TUE, WED, FRI

**Show day of month:** Show day of month in format: 01, 02, 14, 26, 31

**Show month:** Show month in format: JAN, FEB, OCT, DEC, MAR

**Show year:** Show year in format: 2004, 2006, 2007, 2008

**Show text date:** Show text date below title of article in format: Sunday, May 20th, 2007 22:19

Click **Save** button to exit. **Plugin is now active!**
